

# DEWEY DECIMAL SCAVENGER HUNT

In chapter 1 of *Assess and Select Your Sources*, Valerie Bodden explains that libraries use organizational systems to categorize their books. Many libraries organize their books using the Dewey decimal system. While you can search for a book with the library catalog, sometimes it is helpful to look at a whole shelf of books. The Dewey decimal system can help you find many possible sources. Try this activity to sharpen your research skills.

The Dewey decimal system organizes books using three-digit numbers, or call numbers. Call numbers are assigned to book topics. Trains, for example, is assigned 385. So a book about trains would have a call number of 385. Books often have additional numbers that tell you even more about their topic. A book about passenger trains (trains that carry people) would have a call number of 385.22. You can find a library book's call number on its spine.

To get started with your book search, you'll just need the first three digits of the call number. Search your local library for a book with the call numbers listed below. Write down the title of the book. Then guess the topic assigned to the number. What other books on the shelf have the same number?
